




















INTERNATIONAL ROAD FEDERATION (IRF) TODAY





Recommendation/Finding #1: Create Study Abroad Fellow ship

Selection Process

Students are sourced from partner graduate degree programs in target countries Students are informed about the IRF Fellows hip in their admittance package from their home country degree program

Students apply for the Fellows hip prior to starting their graduate degree

IRF and the US partner school (e.g. Purdue, UF) select the Fellows

Recommend minimum # of US universities as partners for Fellowship Program

Encourages stronger US university relationships with IRF

Fosters greater atmosphere/opportunities for Fellows to interact

- Greater # of US universities can be partnered with for Executive Leadership Program
- Study Abroad Fellows Program supplements existing Fellowship Program

Study Abroad Experience:

F ellows matriculate at their transportation graduate degree program Fellows spend 1 term at US partner school enrolled in course work, attending IRF training, mentoring and networking events
